To be known in this way is a priceless thing, because such understanding and acceptance makes it easier to live with our problems, our failings and our worries.

While marriage is the intimate sharing of two lives, it can enhance the differences and individuality of each partner. We must give ourselves in love, but we must not give ourselves away. A good and balanced relationship is one in which neither person is overpowered or absorbed by the other.

Thus it is out of the tension between separateness and union that love, whose incredible strength is equal only to its incredible fragility, is born.
